A TRIBUTE TO DEREK ROWE

On 14 May 1993, a commemorative evening in honour of Derek Rowe, was held in the Clubhouse at Norbury. It proved to be a poignant, yet somehow an enjoyable and successful evening. Over one hundred Old Boys, representatives from the Old Boys League and friends of Derek were present. They came to pay tribute to him, but at the same time to enjoy stories of Clapham College and Old Boys' football.

Brian Sanders, the Chairman of the Association, welcomed everybody to the function. Colin Garvey, Hon. Sec. of the Football Section, read out the apologies from the O.B.F.L. :- Geoff Lence, the Chairman; Jack Treneman, a life President; Jim Butress, the Hon. Sec. and John Billing from Old Wokingians. He welcomed those present- Malcolm Perks, the President; Ken Fletcher, a life President; Brian Watts and Tony Waterson from Old Suttonians; Eddie Myers from Old Thorntonians and Pat Morrissey from Old Salesians.

John Cernuschi, a contemporary of Derek at Clapham College, made the main speech, remembering his own first day at school, and saying to Derek- Where are you from? - Hollywood. said Derek. (It took Johnny several days to work this out.) He remembered the evacuation to East Grinstead and Taunton, Derek's subsequent marriage to Sheila, the birth of their daughter Elizabeth, and all the work Derek did for the Football Section. The words that came to Johnny's mind when he thought of Derek were loyalty and dedication.

Scotty MacDonald remembered some of the lighter moments of Derek's running of the Football Section. He remembered captaining a second eleven team at Raynes Park, which played the first half with ten men, because of the amorous adventures of the eleventh player. Scotty blamed the player for the defeat, and went back to Norbury to describe the incident to Derek in graphic detail. Derek paused, thought for a moment, and said Did you offer the opponents hospitality?

There then followed the unveiling of a plaque in honor of Derek, by Elizabeth Rowe. The display board is also full of photographs of old Clapham Teams. Passed players were interested to see how young and thin they looked in 1955 (or even in 1990!) The stalwarts were present as always- Don Mulvihill, John Woolard, Maurice Ward- who always referred to Derek as the Boy. John Cernuschi's two brothers, Joe and Peter, were there as were Harry Mellor, Dave Slattery, Nino Carracio, Tony (Scratch) Morrish, Ted Hughes, Henry Pinsent, Pete Brown, John McGuire, Phil Leader, Tony Cleather, Paul Zazzi, Frank Hixson, Jim Connor (who claims to remember Alan Webber at Clapham, which is more than anyone else can!) Ernie Hanaghan claimed he hadn't been to Norbury since he left school in 1931- "Your round, Ernie," came the inevitable reply.

It was a fitting tribute to Derek that all the current captains (this had been a very successful season) were there:- John Leatham, Colin Brown, Adie Bertie, Eamon Taggart, Vic Roszkowski (Woolly Bully), Dan Condon and Eddie O'Brien. Brian Casey a

former captain, made a welcome return to Norbury from Liverpool. Dave Leatham and John Mansi were laughing at Wilson Bower's legs (he was in shorts), while Mick Brien, now Treasurer of the O.B.F.L., rounded off the evening with an impersonation of a kick boxer.

The evening was sad yet enjoyable and our thanks are due to all those involved in its preparation.

JOHN GIBB R.I.P.

John, who taught at Clapham College from 1949 to 1975, died suddenly from a massive heart attack on August 20. He was in his early eighties.

John was born in Glasgow, the son of a ship-yard worker, was educated in Glasgow and came to London after completing his war service. He joined the staff at Clapham College, as an assistant English master, in 1949, became Head of the Department in the following year and was appointed Deputy Headmaster in 1970, retiring from teaching on the reorganisation of the School in 1975.

This bare statement of facts hides, of course, the tremendous qualities he had as a teacher and the great contribution he made to the life of the School.

He possessed a natural, quiet and unforced authority which won him the respect of all his students, whether in the first or sixth forms.

He was an effective classroom teacher, arousing interest and enthusiasm in his subject and achieving high standards of performance. I cannot recall ever hearing him raise his voice or lose his temper in all the years that I worked with him.

His contributions to the life of the School were manifold. I recall, with particular pleasure our cooperation in producing the School plays, preparing readings for the Carol Service and organising the Summer Fetes. Above all, I remember what a steadfast colleague he was as a Deputy Headmaster from 1970-5.

Totally reliable and unflappable I knew that, if I was away from school for some reason, I could leave him in charge with total confidence.

On his retirement in 1975 he moved to South Wales to be near his daughter Janice. His wife, Babs, was suffering from progressive Multiple Sclerosis and, although he looked after her himself with tender, loving care, his daughter's proximity provided him with extra support during a very difficult time for him. On Babs's death he moved into his daughter's home where, I know, he proved a shamelessly indulgent grandfather. For business reasons the family moved to Hedon, in Yorkshire, where he died.

I saw him last three years ago. He was completely unchanged, physically and mentally, and clearly the many happy hours he spent on the golf course had kept him very fit.

His whole life was a living witness to the Faith in which he believed, quietly and unostentatiously, but with total commitment. His death, thank God, was sudden and without suffering. He is now gloriously alive and reunited with his beloved wife.

We thank God for his life and his example.

I am sorry to have to record the death of my long-time friend Kevin Carroll. He died on 8 June 1993 of an illness that had been his daily companion for five years. During that time he had drawn courage and grace from his daily attendance at Holy Mass and the love of, and for, his wife, Geraldine, his children, Adrian, Gerald and Nadine, his father, Harry and his sister Jeanne.

Kevin was always a stylish ball-player. He was a useful cricketer, as batsman and bowler, and as left winger he played for Clapham College and for COXA first elevens: but as a table-tennis player he was really outstanding.

Some readers may recall that he was, with Brian Sanders, Tom Ennis and Dave Slattery, a founder and stalwart of the COXA Table-Tennis Section - before that title became something of a misnomer.

Kevin was Henry Pinsent's Best Man and Eddie Kerrin was Kevin's Best Man and among the many other people who have been saddened by his death are Peter Hughes and Bernard Plummer, who with Kevin and the undersigned, were part of a particularly close quartet on many occasions over many years.

After leaving Clapham College Kevin did his National Service in the RAF Police, spending some time in Germany. After his demobilisation he offered himself as a priest but discovered during his time at Womersley that his life's vocation would be found in another role. On return to civilian life he worked for Meredith and Drew Ltd. and later for the Government of Australia in Australia House, London until, seven years ago, he took early retirement for health reasons.

May he rest in peace.

COMMITTEE WORK

It has been an exceptionally busy year for the General Committee of the Old Boys. Apart from the day to day running of the Association a number of additional tasks have been undertaken.

The Articles of both the Association and Sports Club have been updated and will be presented at the Annual General Meetings to be held on 12 November at Norbury.

The Chairman, Brian Sanders, has successfully renegotiated the bar licence for a further 10 years. There are a number of statutory conditions to the renewal of the licence. These include a number of additional requirements to meet fire regulations, but perhaps more importantly for you as a member, there is a requirement for all guests to be signed in when the bar is in use. By arrangement with the police, opposition teams will be signed in en bloc, noting the name and address of the clubs secretary. The Signing in Book is held behind the bar. Please remember that your membership does not extend to your wife, children, girlfriends etc and they should be signed in as visitors. The police have requested that the Association impose a restriction on the number of guests a member may sign in. This matter will be dealt with in the updated Articles to be taken at the AGM.

A working party from the Committee has undertaken a review of the Association's sporting and Clubhouse accommodation. Subsequent to this review an unsuccessful submission was made to the L.B.Southwark for the purchase of the leasehold interest of Pynners Close Playing Field, Dulwich. On this occasion we came third losing out to a private developer who is proposing to use the land as a golf driving range.

The aims and ambitions of the Association are summed up in the submission which is reproduced for your information.

Submission for the purchase of the leasehold of Pynners Close Playing Field by The Clapham Old Xaverians Association.

Clapham Old Xaverians Association was formed in 1927 for the former pupils and staff of Clapham College, London SW4.

Today the Association reflects recent education reforms and our membership is drawn from pupils, former pupils and staff of a number of schools in the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Southwark. Clapham College no longer exists as a secondary school but on the Clapham site is now St Francis Xavier Sixth Form College.

The schools from which we draw members are :

St Francis Xavier Sixth Form College, SW12 (Mixed)
St Thomas the Apostle , Nunhead, SE15 (boys)
Sacred Heart , Camberwell, SE5 (mixed)
St Michael's, Bermondsey, SE1 (mixed)
Bishop Thomas Grant , Streatham, SW16 (mixed)
La Retrait , Balham, SW12 (girls)
John Paul II , Wimbledon, SW19 (mixed)

Our membership is a multi ethnic/racial mix drawn from a variety of social backgrounds and we are particularly active in football and cricket.

Last season the football section fielded seven teams every week and a veteran side in the Old Boys' Football League with four

sides winning championships.

The Cricket section fields three sides every weekend in the summer; two on Saturday and one on Sunday. The Saturday first team play in the Surrey Slazanger Cricket League. A requirement of the league is to provide a ground that meets standards laid down by the competition.

We are currently based at C.O.X.A. Sports Ground in County Road, Thornton Heath, Surrey. Our ground used to consist of two full sized soccer pitches, a junior pitch and a cricket square all maintained by the Association together with clubhouse and changing rooms. However the construction of a primary school on part of the ground has restricted our use to one football pitch and the clubhouse/pavilion. As a consequence the Association must hire at considerable expense both soccer and cricket facilities.

The acquisition of Pynners Close is an ideal opportunity to draw together all activities to a centralised home base.

Should our application for purchase of the premises be successful it would be our intention to transfer our bar and clubhouse facilities to Dulwich Common and within our numbers there are tradesmen and craftsmen who would enable us to meet our obligation to maintain the ground and buildings.

We would also continue to promote the participation of women in sport in providing Netball and Hockey facilities to widen our membership.

Our existing facilities are made available to our membership schools as required. The Association runs an annual five a side competition for the schools and our members offer school leavers career opportunities / work experience.

The Association also runs a number of social activities for members and their families. e.g Golf society, quiz nights, picnics, barbecues, race nights, football and cricket tours for playing and non-playing members and produces a magazine for our members.

The Association's motto is "Concordia Resparvae Crescunt" which means "In harmony little things grow". The aim of the Association is to continue to flourish and provide for an increased membership, opportunities for sport and social activities and for promoting and developing life long friendships.

Centralising all our activities at Dulwich Common will fulfill most of our aims and ambitions.
